INTERNSHIP PROGRAM

The Abiding Presence college-age internship program has four key pillars: faith formation, vocational discernment, relationship building and leadership development. In the mornings, this looks like participating in daily devotions, learning how to pray with and for one another and studying scripture. We invite members of the congregation to share about their faith and how it connects to the work they do in the world. Then, in the afternoons, interns are in leadership positions as they help to run our six-week summer day camp ministry.

Abiding Together, the college-age internship program is an important way our church is living out Jesus' command to "make disciples."



We believe college-age young adults are in a season where they are making big decisions about what they want their lives, the world and the church to look like. Through this internship program, faith becomes a lens through which our young adults look to make these decisions. As their church community, we equip them with knowledge, relationships and experiences that will guide them into the future to which God is calling them.

Each day of the internship begins with Morning Prayer, where we pray this prayer that sums up our hopes, dreams and prayers for our collegeage young adults:

O God, you have called your servants to ventures of which we cannot see the ending, by paths as yet untrodden, through perils unknown. Give us faith to go out with good courage, not knowing where we go, but only that your hand is leading us and your love supporting us; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

May the stories of our summer interns give you good courage and remind all of us that God's hand is leading us and God's love is supporting us – always.

Peyton said that the relationships she formed through the internship program are what made her feel more connected to the church. She said the friends that she's made here are one of her favorite parts of the experience overall.


"This program made me realize that church is more than just a location that people go to on Sundays. It's a community of like-minded individuals."

"Inclusivity is something I want to prioritize in my teaching," Maddie said. "The program here shows that it's not that hard to do a few extra things to make a kid more comfortable and more successful."


Since starting with the internship program, Grace has found herself more comfortable and confident in her faith. She says devotions have really helped her find her footing and develop her own perspective on scripture.

While working at Abiding Presence, Scott has learned about what he wants to do for his future career.

"I was connected with a member here who is in the computer science field and he urged me to start looking at a specialty within the field," Scott shared. "I've learned I don't want to be in IT, but I do like working with sounds and music."

Scott credits the work he does at camp as having helped lead him in the right direction in his career. "Having experience with doing music in different settings and leading music in different settings has been helpful."


"This program has brought me closer to my faith for sure."

Being connected through work and other social opportunities has kept Ally connected to the church and her community at home, even when she's away at school. In particular, Ally identified the campus visits that Pastor Meredith and Pastor Kelsey have made throughout the year as being impactful.

"Going and being at school is hard and it's easy to lose sight of that important aspect of human connection," Ally said. "Getting to keep my faith steady and confident throughout the year is really nice and meaningful."

This summer, Ally is working both with ECHO as well as the mental health and neurodiversity ministries at Abiding Presence.

"It feels really good that I'm able to connect with people in those related fields and spearhead getting those ministries more publicized."

The past three summers, Ally helped with the children's ministry and summer camp program. Ally says this experience helped her learn about herself and what she wants in a career.

"I went into the internship program thinking that I wanted to be an elementary school teacher," Ally said. "I got to learn that wasn't really my vibe, and I was way more passionate about mental health."

Currently, Ally is a rising senior at the University of Mary Washington studying Psychology with a minor in Neuroscience. After college, Ally wants to go to graduate school to become a clinical psychologist.

"I feel like it's extremely beneficial to have a program that's very open-minded and accepting because I feel like this generation is very different from generations that have existed before in the church," Ally said. "I think it's very important to have a program that highlights that and treats it as a strength."

"Michaela has listened to me rant and has been so supportive," Edmee shared. "It's nice to have people who listen and I know they care."

Building relationships is an integral part of our internship program. Our interns do so much more than work. As a church, we see this program as an investment in people. Interns participate in activities outside of typical work tasks, including educational trips to museums, spirit days and team building activities.
